






Behavior tends to occur "off the beaten path" and the more you move, the less likely students will have extended time to participate in challenging behaviors

Trying to find the good stuff can be challenging but can go such a long way to changing behavior. Some things to be on the look out for are;

- Being kind to others
- Taking turns
- Ignoring something they would usually react to
- Helping someone
- Following directions the first time
- Stopping something they love to do





Because there is so much going on at once, we often don't take the time to determine if the corrections are really needed or important. Giving students a little room to make their own decisions (even if they are mistakes) not only makes things easier for you, it allows students to develop their problem solving skills.
